As part of the PNWIS Blue Sky III Strategic Plan, prioritization and motivation was placed on students and young professionals to encourage their participation and growing roles in A&WMA chapter and section programs. There has been an enthusiastic response from college students in environmental studies to our Environmental Challenge (EC) program, and we expect the EC fund to hit our goal of \$100,000 within the next few months. We have a new and thriving PNWIS student chapter at Huxley. In recognition that EC is but one piece of a broad-based student outreach program, this year we created a new Student Programs committee, comprised of EC, student mentoring, growing new student chapters, and helping new graduates to transition into the professional workplace and become the future of our profession and our organization.

In addition to our college student programs, the K-12 education and public outreach programs continue to be a priority. We have expanded out from the schools to conduct exercises from Environmental Resource Guides (ERG's) with girl scouts and boy scouts to help them earn their badges. There continue to be more worthwhile and valuable programs to spend our money and time on than we can handle, and we see opportunities to grow and expand at every turn.

At the first PNWIS Board meeting I attended in 1996 as the Alaska Chapter Chair, a major topic of conversation was improving the financial status of our non-profit organization to ensure our continued viability. A planning summit, Blue Sky I, was held to address what changes we needed to make to grow and meet the needs of our membership. Since that time, our annual and specialty technical conferences have been so successful that in 2006, we recognized that our operating paradigm has shifted to ensuring that the funds we have are used to maximize service to our members.

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AIR QUALITY PLANNER GOES INTERNATIONAL - Submitted by Ken Reid

In June 2006, Air & Waste Management Association members elected Laurie Bates-Frymel to the International Board of Directors. The A&WMA Board of Directors is a diverse group of professionals selected to represent all segments of the environmental industry. The focus of the Board is on strategic planning to assure continued viability of the Association as changes in the professional world present significant challenges in delivering value to the membership.

Laurie is thrilled about her election and is quick to point out that she will be the youngest Board member on record. Appropriately, one of Laurie's tasks will be to lead a program that improves A&WMA's services for young environmental professionals and encourages their involvement in the Association. Laurie will officially join fellow PNWIS member Jim Pfeiffer on the A&WMA Board in January 2007. Her term will last three years.

Laurie has been actively involved with A&WMA activities at the Section and Chapter levels for the past 8 years. Before moving to Vancouver, BC three years ago, she held several offices with the Canadian Prairie and Northern Section including Chair, Technical Program Director, and

Communications Director. Laurie has also served on numerous conference organizing committees. In fact, Laurie first met Dave Dornbush, Jim Pfeiffer and Dan Mahar while she was Technical Program Co-Chair for the joint CPANS-PNWIS Air Toxics Conference in Banff in 2000!

Laurie has a BSc in Meteorology and an After Degree in Environmental Physics and Chemistry, both from the University of Alberta. She currently works with the Greater Vancouver Regional District (GVRD) as an air quality planner. Laurie was responsible for coordinating the development of a new Air Quality Management Plan for Greater Vancouver, which was approved by the GVRD Board in October 2005. She is now heavily involved with the implementation of the plan's actions, managing a number of inter-agency scientific studies, reviewing the GVRD's regulatory framework, consulting with stakeholders and the public, and delivering presentations for various audiences.

SUCCESSFUL TRAINING IN IDAHO - Submitted by Kevin Schilling

The Idaho Chapter sponsored a two day AERMOD training course on September 11 – 12. The course was very timely, with the requirement that AERMOD be used for all air permit modeling analyses after November 6, 2006. BeeLine Software staff, developers of the BEEST dispersion modeling GUI, provided instruction for the class, which included both lecture and hands-on computer training.

Approximately 20 scientist and engineers attended the course, with a wide representation from government, consulting, and industry.

Preliminary accounting indicates the Idaho Chapter will make a profit after expenses are paid. This will be a great boost for the Chapter in preparation for the 2007 conference.

STUDENT EC INTERNATIONAL (ECi) COMPETITION AT ACE'08

The Student Environmental Challenge (EC) is going international in 2008! PNWIS has hosted four EC competitions (beginning with the Mini-Challenge at PNWIS 2002). We will continue to host the EC as part of each PNWIS annual conference. The EC international (ECi) will be held for the very first time at the A&WMA annual conference and exhibition (ACE) in June, 2008 (Portland, Oregon). The PNWIS Local Host Committee is already planning that event.

Decade of the Student: Students continue to bring vitality to our association as they finish their education and move into environmental careers. PNWIS members have always recognized student mentoring opportunities and responsibilities. We are actively stimulating and sustaining connections with regional university communities. And, we encourage their participation in chapter and section events and activities.

The Air & Waste Management Association (A&WMA) has also identified student programs as a top priority. This year, the A&WMA Board approved a proposal to

introduce the ECi as an integral part of each ACE event. PNWIS recommended that the initial event be introduced in 2008 since our section is the Local Host Committee (LHC) for that conference, we have experience in planning EC competitions, and that would give other sections time to try out regional competitions. A&WMA agreed and we are already developing a framework for that competition.

We expect significant interest in the ECi competition from universities all over the world. The challenge problem will be international in scope such that teams will have a "level playing field" in the competition. The ECi will be added to existing ACE student programs to provide a broader spectrum of participation opportunities. - Last September Puget Sound Chapter members helped organize a one-day workshop focused on the new low sulfur diesel rules. The event was a success with 100 persons attending.
- In October, the Chapter hosted a tour of a digester gas utilization project. Fourteen members joined the tour.
- Listen up, trainees! In May, Steve Nelson headed a planning committee to organize an “Environmental Managers Bootcamp”. The workshop focused on providing basic information every environmental manager needs to manage an environmental program. Critical air pollution, wastewater and hazardous waste issues were discussed. The 60 attendees had many positive comments about the program and the organizing committee has discussed the possibility of holding workshops at other locations.
- In August, Chapter member Steve Rybolt organized a “brown-bag lunch” presentation entitled “Climate Change In the Pacific Northwest”. The event was held in Olympia and 30 people attended.

- The Puget Sound Chapter will be a sponsor at a fund raising event on October 5th for the Northwest Straits Chapter of the Surfrider Foundation. The Surfrider Foundation, founded in 1984, is a non-profit environmental organization dedicated to the protection and enjoyment of the world's oceans, waves and beaches for all people, through conservation, activism, research and education. We will have a booth at the event and hope to welcome new Chapter members as a result of this alliance with the Surfrider Foundation.
- Chapter members will present a mini workshop (hour and a half lunch-time event) in late October on stratospheric ozone.
